





Introduction

About Kumano Kodo Center

The center commemorates the World Heritage listing of Kumano Kodo (Iseji) sacred sites and pilgrimage routes in the Kii Mountain Range. It was established by Mie Prefecture to inform visitors about Kumano Kodo and surrounding areas, mix with local people and in turn revitalize the region.

Role of Kumano Kodo Center

We collect, accumulate and provide information concerning the nature, history and culture of Kumano Kodo and surrounding areas on the theme of 'People and the path: here at, here in, and here after.' We also assist with exchanges between visitors to Kumano Kodo, welcoming parties and local people.

Activities of Kumano Kodo Center

To make good use of the architectural space, we developed activities unique to the center, such as exhibitions, workshops, courses and lectures, concerts, and events that give full play to Eastern Kishu's individual character. Furthermore, to promote exchanges, we are producing a wide variety of outdoor activities based around the center, such as a photography school, haiku traveling club and pilgrimage route walks.



Sacred sites and pilgrimage routes in the Kii Mountain Range

Although there are differences in the origins and details of Shinto, which values the natural world, Buddhism, which was introduced from China, and mixtures of the two, such as Shugendo, the Kii Mountain Range embraces religious sites centered on the three sacred mountains of Kumano Sanzan, Yoshino–Omine and Koyasan. Together with the pilgrimage routes that lead to the sacred sites and are used for training in mountain austerities, these sites have played an important role in the development and exchange of Japanese religion and culture, and integrated people's religious beliefs and the natural environment since early times.

The sacred sites and pilgrimage routes in the Kii Mountain Range are World Heritage listed. They are recognized for the unique cultural landscape of the three great sacred sites and pilgrimage routes of Kumano Sankei-michi, Omine Okugake-michi and Koyasan Choishi-michi and others that extend across the three prefectures of Mie, Nara, and Wakayama. The sacred sites and pilgrimage routes in the Kii Mountain Range is the first cultural heritage recognized as a cultural landscape in its entirety in Japan.

World Heritage Listing

A condition to being listed as World Heritage is universal value worldwide. For this reason, it is necessary to meet one or more of the World Heritage criterion classified as cultural heritage and natural heritage, and satisfy the conditions of authenticity and integrity. The sacred sites and pilgrimage routes in the Kii Mountain Range meets four criterion out of the six cultural heritage criterion for World Heritage listing. This cultural heritage including monuments, sites and cultural landscapes, is preserved under unified efforts involving governments through local residents.

Construction



Exhibition In constructing Kumano Kodo Center as a wooden building befitting of Kumano Kodo, we attempted to create a large space

with a fine new wooden structural system. Using local Owase hinoki cypress and Kumano cedar lumber as sold in markets, the structure is composed of blocks of solid natural wood of the same cross-section (135 mm \times 135 mm), without using a truss frame or laminated wood

Constructed of pillars, beams and walls made of bundled rectangular Owase hinoki cypress timber, the buildings show the simple beauty and strength of straight lines of wood while respecting decorous traditional Japanese building methods.



B. Aspects of Kumano Kodo

Through photos, models and so on, various aspects of the paths of Kumano including the climate around Kumano Kodo, which is warm with a high rainfall, the sea, sky and land are introduced.






